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ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS OF HARYANA STATE LEGAL SERVICES AUTHORITY (HALSA) DURING THE FINANCIAL YEAR 2012-2013

Constituted in 1995 under The Legal Services Authorities Act, 1987, Haryana State Legal Services Authority (HALSA), is engaged in multifarious tasks. These include providing free and competent legal aid & other legal services to the needy; spreading legal literacy under various schemes thus enhancing the legal awareness level of the citizens; and providing them with an opportunity to resolve their differences amicably through various alternative modes of dispute redressal without having to knock at the doors of the courts.

The countless number of HALSA initiatives flow from the need to realize the mandate given by Article 39-A of the Constitution of India to ensure access to justice and meaningfully effectuate the constitutional goals of equality, liberty and fraternity; and the cherished Right to Life guaranteed under Article 21.

Quintessentially, HALSA seeks to reach out to the people, especially the needy, with the hand of legal help, and offers them a range of options of legal recourse, to make a choice. This works as a balm on the feelings hurt by the lack of legal awareness, and serves as a beacon for those groping in the darkness of ignorance. The need for HALSA arises from the ground level reality that most people in the country are ignorant about the laws enacted by their elected representatives. This ignorance deprives them of the benefits, which would have accrued to them from different laws, and leads to their exploitation and unwanted and avoidable suffering.

“ACCESS TO JUSTICE FOR ALL” is the motto of Legal services Authorities. In order to achieve this aim, HALSA is performing the following activities:

- Providing free and competent legal aid & other legal services to the entitled persons.
- Arrange alternative modes of disputes redressal like Lok Adalat, Mediation and pre-litigation Conciliation
- Creating Legal awareness amongst the masses under various schemes.
- Other Steps to help people to have ‘Access to Justice’
 - Model Scheme for Legal Aid Prosecution Counsel
 - Front Office in every Legal Service Institution

- Para-Legal Volunteers
- Setting up of Legal Aid Clinics
- Setting up of District ADR Centers
- Publicity by various modes
- Toll Free Helpline
- Victim Compensation Scheme

FREE LEGAL AID & OTHER SERVICES

One of the main activities of HALSA is to provide court based free and competent legal aid & other services to the specified categories of persons, which amongst others include:

- Any citizen, whose annual income from all sources does not exceed Rs.1,50,000/-;
- Members of Scheduled Castes or Scheduled Tribes or Backward Classes;
- Victims of trafficking in human beings or beggar;
- women;
- children;
- persons with disability;
- industrial workmen;
- Ex-serviceman; Freedom fighters,
- persons in custody, including custody in a protective home, "children home, observation home, shelter home or special home;
- Transgenders;
- Senior Citizens.

Free Legal Services include not only the payment of fee to the advocate, but also charges relating to court fee, drafting, typing, summoning of opposite party/witnesses etc. These services are available for filing or defending any case before any court, tribunal or administrative authority.

Haryana State Legal Services Authority has provided free legal aid to 4523 persons during 2012-2013.

- Selection of Panel Advocates

1242 Advocates are on the panel of the Legal Services Authorities in 21 Districts of Haryana, selected by Committees headed by District & Sessions Judges, who are also the Chairpersons of District Legal Services Authorities

- Scrutinizing Committee: Scrutinizing Committees have been constituted in each District and Sub-Division of Haryana to scrutinize and evaluate the applications for providing free Legal Services.
- Monitoring Committee: Monitoring Committees have been constituted in each District and Sub-Division of Haryana for close monitoring of the court based legal services rendered; and the progress of the cases in legal aid matters.



ALTERNATIVE MODES OF DISPUTES REDRESSAL

(A) LOK ADALATS

Haryana State Legal Services Authority has leveraged the important mechanism of 'Lok Adalat' as an effective alternative dispute resolution method for ensuring quick and final consensual disposal of cases binding on the parties, without incurring any extra cost or fees. Following kinds of Lok Adalats are being organized.

- (a) Scheduled Lok Adalats
- (b) Daily Lok Adalats
- (c) Mobile/ Rural Lok Adalats
- (d) Special Lok Adalats
- (e) Jail Lok Adalats and
- (f) Permanent Lok Adalats for Public Utility Services

(a) Scheduled Lok Adalats

HALSA is organizing scheduled Lok Adalats in all the districts courts and sub divisional courts of Haryana from time to time as per the schedule prepared by DLSAs. In these Lok Adalats, pending cases of all nature are taken up by different Lok Adalat benches presided over by judicial officers and members. These Lok Adalats have proved to be very successful, particularly with regard to MACT Cases.

These Lok Adalats have settled 19882 cases during 2012-2013.

(b) Daily Lok Adalats.

Daily Lok Adalats were first started in one of the districts on experimental basis. After encouraging results, these daily Lok Adalats were started in the remaining districts. At present, daily Lok Adalats are being held in all the 21 districts.

Every court of the sessions division, after court hours, gets converted into Daily Lok Adalat and judicial officers hold sittings for this, depending upon the workload of cases coming for settlement every day in each court. This way, there are as many Daily Lok Adalats as the number of courts in that sessions division. A daily Lok Adalat is assisted by one lawyer or social worker on the panel.

These Lok Adalats have settled more than 74,534 cases during 2012-2013.

(c) Mobile/Rural Lok Adalats

HALSA is organizing Mobile/Rural Lok Adalats in the villages to make speedy and inexpensive justice available to the people at their door step by amicable resolution of their disputes through the respectable of the village and Village Gram Panchayats. In these Mobile/Rural Lok



Adalats, all the pending cases in the courts as well as cases at pre-litigative stage of such village and adjoining villages are taken up for settlement.

Earlier these rural Lok Adalats were presided over by judicial officers by rotation. However, since October, 2011, these Adalats are being attended by Panel Advocates and Para Legal Volunteers, who make efforts to bring parties together in all pending matters of that area, where rural Lok Adalat takes place, to arrive at an amicable settlement. Similar efforts are made in pre-litigation matters of that area. The cases, in which parties agree for settlement, are then taken up in the forthcoming Lok Adalat.

Earlier these rural Lok Adalats were presided over by judicial officers

These Lok Adalats have settled more than 5750 cases during 2012-2013.

(d) Special Lok Adalats

Special Lok Adalats are organized from time to time for disposing of specific kind of cases e.g. Cases for compensation under Motor Vehicles Act, Negotiable Instruments Act etc.

(e) Jail Lok Adalats:

Jail Lok Adalats are organized for the accused in custody. Every month, Secretary, DLSA visits the jail and identifies the petty compoundable cases, in which accused want to confess their guilt on the basis of Plea Bargaining. Those cases pending before different Magistrates are then taken up by the Chief Judicial Magistrate in the forthcoming Jail Lok Adalat and are disposed of.

Vide letter No.16727-16768 dated 8.12.2011, this Authority had sent the following schedule to all the Districts for holding of Special Lok Adalats for dealing with compoundable criminal cases of under-trial prisoners.

(f) Permanent Lok Adalats (Public Utility Services)

On the initiative of HALSA, the Haryana Government sanctioned 11



Permanent Lok Adalats (PLAs) pertaining to public utility services having jurisdiction for all the 21 districts of Haryana.

In these Lok Adalats, cases relating to Public utility services: namely (i) transport service for the carriage

of passengers or goods by air, road or water; or (ii) postal, telegraph or telephone service; or (iii) supply of power, light or water to the public by any establishment; or (iv) system of public conservancy or sanitation; or (v) service



in hospital or dispensary; or (vi) insurance service (vii) housing and estates (viii) banking and finance, in which dispute is up to the value of Rs. 25 lakh are taken up at the Pre-litigative stage and settled without any expenditure at the earliest, on the basis of conciliation. In case, conciliation fails, the PLA has the power to decide special category of cases on merits on basis of equity, justice and good conscience, without going into legal technicalities

These Lok Adalats have settled 3604 cases during 2012-2013.

Overall, all kinds of Lok Adalats mentioned above have settled 1,03,770 cases during 2012-2013 and compensation of more than Rs. 11 crores has been awarded in 544 Motor Accident Claims cases.

(B) MEDIATION AND PRE-LITIGATION CONCILIATION

Mediation is yet another mode of alternative dispute resolution mechanism provided to the people to settle their pending disputes. Courts refer suitable cases to the Mediation Centre for settlement by mediation, where a mediator trained by Mediation & Conciliation Project Committee conducts the mediation, in an environment conducive for the purpose.

Such Mediation Centers have been opened in all the districts of Haryana. Steps are being taken to take the mediation at Sub-Division level also.

Recently, on the orders of Apex Court, Pre-litigation Mediation desks have also been put up in all the Mediation Centers to deal with matrimonial disputes, before they reach the court.

In Haryana, we have 433 trained mediators, who include Judges, retired judicial Officers and advocates. To spare the time of judges, most of the cases are referred for mediation through advocate mediators.

1681 cases have been settled through mediation during 2012-2013.

LEGAL AWARENESS CAMPAIGN

About sixty five per cent of the people in Haryana live in rural areas and many of them are illiterate. Most of the people are legally illiterate, as they are not aware of their rights conferred upon them by law. Even substantial number of literate people living in the cities and villages do not know what are their rights and entitlements under various laws. It is this absence of legal awareness which is responsible for the deception and exploitation of people at the hands of unscrupulous elements.

With a view to raising the legal awareness quotient of the people so that their sufferings are mitigated, HALSA has embarked on a mission to spread legal awareness in every nook and corner of the state under various programmes. Legal awareness camps aim at creating awareness among people about their rights under various laws and welfare Schemes pertaining to women, children, Scheduled Castes, underprivileged, poor and the needy people to help achieve development goals.

Following steps have been taken by Haryana State Legal Services Authority for Legal Awareness Campaign in the State of Haryana: -

- (a) Legal Literacy/Legal Awareness Camps/Seminars
- (b) Sensitization workshops
- (c) Implementation of Legal Literacy Missions
- (d) Publicity through print and electronic Media
- (e) Publication by Haryana State Legal Services Authority

(a) Legal Literacy/Legal Awareness Camps/Seminars

On the direction of this Authority, all the District Legal Services Authorities are organizing Legal Literacy/Legal Awareness Camps in the remote rural areas in the State of Haryana at least once a week i.e. on Sunday/holidays, on the topics concerning SC/ST,



Women and children and general public, so that the common man may be made aware about his legal rights.

3064 Legal Literacy Camps have been organized during 2012-2013 in which 4,56,862 persons have been benefitted.

(c) Implementation of Legal Literacy Missions

In order to achieve the objective of spreading Legal Literacy, Haryana State Legal Services Authority has implemented special Legal Literacy Missions.

❖ Prisoners Legal Literacy Mission (PLLM)

The main objective of the Prisoners Legal Literacy Mission (PLLM) is to provide access to justice and to eradicate the evils of exploitation, inequality and suffering with the lamp of literacy. The project envisions that legal literacy will reform the mindset of the prisoners and help them become responsible members of the society. The objectives of the mission are to target the prisons and jails in a systematic manner and to hold Legal Awareness Camps in prisons, prepare and publish Legal Literacy Literature in local language and to circulate the same amongst the prisoners; to organize skits and audio/visual presentations for the prisoners to educate them about their rights; to co-ordinate with the prison authorities to ensure that freedoms that belong to the prisoners are made available to them and to help improve prison conditions by setting up low cost programmes such as crafts, weaving, workshops etc. which are vacation oriented and self-financed. The project is being implemented and monitored at the district level by the District & Sessions Judge-cum-Chairman of the District Legal Services Authority.

❖ Legal Literacy Mission for empowerment of underprivileged (LLUP)

One of the most under-privileged and disadvantaged class of persons comprises those who live in shelters and care homes such as Nari Niketan, juvenile homes, senior citizens homes, mental hospitals, homes for the blind, homes for deaf and dumb, orphanages etc. The Legal Literacy Mission for Empowerment of Underprivileged (LLUP) aims at reaching out to such underprivileged and disabled persons, make them aware of their legal rights, and take such legal steps as are required for enforcing their statutory rights.

❖ Legal Literacy for Students (LLS)

With a view to make the students legally literate, Haryana State Legal Services Authority with the collaboration of Education Department of Haryana has opened Legal Literacy Clubs 1715 in Government Senior Secondary/Secondary Schools and Govt. Colleges; and 633 in private schools/colleges.

It is one of the most popular programmes, whose impact has been felt in the entire state. Students, the object of the programme, also serve as vehicles of legal literacy for the society. Competitions are held on selected socio-legal topics among students to enable them to showcase and develop their skills in skits, painting, poetry, slogan writing, declamation, essay writing etc at district, division and state level. The competitions culminate with an Annual function which is attended by high dignitaries from the Legislature, Executive and Judiciary where the winning students are awarded prizes.

So far, more than 25 lac students have been accessed through students Legal Literacy Mission-programmes.

(d) Publicity through print and electronic Media by:

Publishing different publicity material e.g.

- books
- pamphlets,
- Information Booklets; and
- Displays:
- flex banners,
- Calendars etc.
- Wide publicity through the leading newspapers, cable TV Television; Radio etc.
- organizing skits and nukkar Nataks

- displaying documentary films

Stalls are put up in major public gatherings, where Panel Advocates or Para Legal Volunteers provide information to the people about availability of various legal services.

Publicity regarding Mediation, Lok Adalats, legal aid and legal literacy programmes in Haryana is also done by the Information, Public Relations and Cultural Affairs Department, Haryana through electronic and print media.

On 9th November every year i.e. Legal Services Day, Hon'ble Executive Chairman of this Authority attends a talk show on TV, highlighting activities of HALSA and explains the various schemes being run by HALSA for downtrodden people. It is telecasted all over Haryana. Similar talk shows are broadcasted on All India Radio, Chandigarh.

(e) Publication by Haryana State Legal Services Authority

27 booklets on various subjects and a booklet containing welfare schemes of Central and State Government have been got printed by HALSA. These are distributed to the common people, which is very useful for creating awareness amongst the people.

OTHER STEPS TO HELP PEOPLE TO HAVE 'ACCESS TO JUSTICE'

❖ Model Scheme for Legal Aid Prosecution Counsel

In 2009, HALSA started the Model Scheme for Legal Aid Prosecution Counsel for victims of rape and other crimes against women and children in all the districts of Haryana. Under the scheme, lady advocates on the panel of District Legal Services Authority (DLSA) visit the police station falling under jurisdiction of concerned courts allotted to them to give legal assistance to the victims. At the stage of trial also, any victim of such crime can be provided the services of such legal aid counsel. Recently, modified instructions have been issued to the district legal services authority (DLSA) secretaries to approach the rape victim or victim of any other crime against women or children with all kinds of legal assistance. A female Para legal volunteer or woman panel advocate is attached with the victim without waiting for a call from the police station. This is done irrespective of the fact whether the case has been reported to the police or not.

This scheme has benefited more than 2700 women Victims so far.

❖ Front Office manned by retainers

Front Offices in all Legal Services Institutions have been set up to provide legal services. These are manned by Retainer advocates, who devote their time exclusively to legal aid work. They render services like drafting notices, sending replies to lawyer's and drafting applications, petitions etc. The retainers are available on rotation basis in the front office established in the court complexes and advice to any person, who approaches them with any legal problem. Front offices have been set up in all the districts and sub divisions of Haryana.

❖ Para-Legal Volunteers



Hon'ble Mr. Justice S.K.Mittal, Judge, Punjab & Haryana High Court-cum-Executive Chairman, HALSA chaired the meeting with Panel Advocates & Para Legal Volunteers

Picked up from target groups, Para legal volunteers seek to realize the vision of Mahatma Gandhi to reach the 'Poorest man in the remotest village'. They act as harbingers of legal awareness and legal aid to all sections of the society and create awareness among the people about

their rights and responsibilities. Besides, the volunteers help people in resolving their differences amicably, provide legal aid as and when required; and act as intermediaries between the common people and legal services institutions by pulling down all barriers in the way of access to justice. Trained volunteers are also deputed to work in the Legal Aid Clinics for assisting the seekers of legal aid for drafting petitions, applications and for accompanying them to the government offices for interacting with the officials for solving the problems of legal aid.

About 2000 Para-Legal Volunteers have been selected & trained so far.

❖ Legal Care & Support Centers (Legal Aid Clinics)

Access to justice is the fundamental right of every citizen. But due to the expensive, complicated and time consuming legal procedure, the disadvantaged sections of the society generally do not take recourse to law.



Committed to provide legal aid at no cost to the disadvantaged, HALSA launched the initiative of opening Legal Care & Support Centers earlier known as Legal Aid Clinics, as per NALSA Regulations. Such centres have been set up in all court complexes, prisons, protection homes and elsewhere. Patterned on the primary health centers, these are intended to make legal relief easily accessible to the indigent and backward sections of our society. The centres bring those suffering and legal services institutions closer. In a Legal Care & Support Centers, Panel lawyer or Para Legal Volunteers provide legal services to the people.



The scheme provides inexpensive local machinery for rendering legal services of basic nature like legal advice, drafting of petitions, notices, replies, applications and other documents of legal importance and also resolves the disputes of the local people, thereby preventing the disputes reaching courts. In cases where legal services of a higher level are

required, the matter is referred to the legal services institutions established under the Legal Services Authorities Act, 1987.

Publicity material, book-lets, pamphlets, various kind of forms meant for availing different welfare benefits like Ration Card, Caste Certificate, old age pension, widow pension, senior citizen card etc; and for availing various utilities like electricity connection, water connection, driving license, mutation etc. are kept in these Legal Aid Clinics. Para Legal Volunteers help illiterate people in filling these forms to avail various benefits under the Schemes.



128 Legal Care & Support Centers/Legal Aid Clinics have been set up in villages, Courts, Law Colleges, office of Protection Officers, Jails, urban areas, slums, labour colonies, Primary Health Centers etc. during 2012-2013.

56625 applications were received in these Legal Aid Clinics during this period for seeking legal services, more than 48419 persons get benefited.

Student legal aid clinics have been set up by law colleges and law universities also. However, in such clinics the students in the final year classes render legal services and the junior students assist them.

The students working in the remote villages conduct surveys with the assistance of the Para-legal volunteers and voluntary social welfare institutions working at the grass-root level.

The student legal aid clinics send reports to the State Legal Services Authority with copies to the legal services institutions having territorial jurisdiction and also to the concerned DLSAs.

Besides, the student legal aid clinics in the rural areas, law colleges and law universities have also set up permanent legal aid clinics attached to their institutions.

❖ District ADR Centers to serve as Single Window

District Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) Centers are being set up in all Districts of Haryana with the funds provided by Thirteenth Finance Commission (TFC) for improving Justice delivery system. Said ADR centers are being set up at an accessible location and in the vicinity of the District Courts.



The objective of the ADR centre is two-fold: to bring all ADR facilities under one roof for the convenience of people, who can access solutions to their problems at one place; and to function as a hub for all kinds of ADR activities--conciliation, mediation, arbitration, Lok Adalat and judicial settlement, making it a multi-service centre.

ADR Centers consist of a 'front office, Library; Waiting Room; Facility for conducting Lok Adalats/Permanent Lok Adalat constituted under

Section 22B; A combined Office space for the District Legal Services Authority and the ADR Centre; Cubicles for conducting mediation/conciliation/ Arbitration; computer room; Conference/Meeting room and other common facilities.

❖ HELPLINE:

Haryana State Legal Services Authority has a toll free helpline number 1800-180-2057 for providing legal advice to the people.

Any citizen desirous of legal advice may personally visit the office of Member Secretary, Haryana State Legal Services Authority; or call toll free helpline number 1800-180-2057 for getting free legal advice for his/her case. An official of this Authority remains present in the said centre from 9.00 A.M. to 12.00 O'clock (midnight) on all working days. He ensures the services of an empanelled Advocate of State Legal Services Authority/District Legal Services Authority on telephone for legal advice to the citizens for resolving their legal problems. Helpline telephone numbers have also been provided in each district legal services authority, where anybody can contact for getting legal service.

1242 calls were received during 2012-2013.

VICTIM COMPENSATION SCHEME

Haryana Victim Compensation Scheme, 2013 has been recently framed in view of Section 357A of Code of Criminal Procedure, 1973. The Scheme envisages grant of Compensation to the eligible Victims of Crime like rape, loss of life, injury causing disability or loss of limb or severe mental agony to women and child victims in cases like Human trafficking, kidnapping, molestation etc. Compensation up to Rs. 3 Lacs is payable after due inquiry by District Legal Services Authority. There is provision for interim compensation also. Eligible Victim is entitled to Compensation not only when conviction takes place, but also if acquittal is recorded; or even in case, where victim is identified but accused is not identified or traced.

Scheme having been recently introduced, compensation amounting to approx. Rs.25,00,000/- has been awarded in 20 Cases only so far. Efforts are being made to make the people aware about the Scheme so that maximum people can take the benefit thereof.

KEY PRIORITIES OF THE PEOPLE IN THE STATE OF HARYANA IN TERMS OF ACCESS TO JUSTICE

Key priorities of the people are:

- Speedy disposal of the pending cases
- Easy Access to Justice
- Legal Awareness

HALSA envisions not only making every citizen of Haryana legally literate, aware of his rights and duties, but also making the justice delivery system accessible to him, so that the objective of 'Access to Justice for all' is achieved. The Authority is taking every step possible to instill confidence in the poorest of the poor, and those living in the remotest villages, that by approaching the legal system, they can get their rights enforced.
